ePortfolio Platform Vendor Demos

ePortfolios are personal websites that provide students with a space to reflect on their curricular and co-curricular experiences, curate evidence of skills and learning, and display their knowledge through a variety of mediums, including presentations, documents, videos, images, and more. In addition to being a space for students to reflect on their learning, ePortfolios are a rich source of course and programmatic assessment. Within the chosen

platform, faculty will have a variety of ways to provide feedback through comments, rubrics, and summative grades that integrate with Canvas.

These demos start in April, and we encourage faculty, staff, and students to attend and provide feedback on the finalists.

Survey on Signature Work

Many faculty and staff across campus mentor undergraduate student work through capstones, independent studies, undergraduate research, honors theses, and other opportunities that allow students to apply their learning beyond the classroom to complex problems that are important to the student and the public good. Recognizing the significant effort that goes into mentoring such signature work, an institutional Task Force on Supporting Signature Work @ DU has been convened to identify facilitators and barriers. The Task Force is focused on finding ways to better support faculty and staff who are already mentoring or are interested in mentoring signature work.
